Why So Few New Run Times?

As of February 1, the District adjusted the run times on these lines: 9, 22, 27, 28, 51A, 52, 70, 200, 210, 211, and NX. But they didn't extend them to what the drivers actually need. And they only adjusted these lines when we all know way more lines need extended run times. The problem with the run times is that we are either taking our breaks and running behind or skipping our breaks and rushing to get home on time. This is not good enough. We need run times that are realistic.

Changing the 54: Who Benefits?

The District changed the 54 making it the new shuttle service back to D4. But what will that do to the run time? The 54 was one of the few lines that usually guaranteed a break. But now switching it to the employee shuttle will extend the run time. Can the District even make this change during a regular Division sign-up? Doesn't it have to go through the annual system sign-up? Once again, the District makes their changes without any concern for the actual workers who run the system.

For AC, Adding More Means Taking Away

The District is trying to brag about how they are responsive to riders' needs. They finally added service on a few lines that were too full and had to regularly skip stops with passengers (lines: 60, 684, G, F, O, and P). But at AC, whenever the District adds service in one place, it just means they take it away somewhere else. They refuse to add new positions, which would be the best way to improve service and run times.

So, just because they added service on these lines doesn't mean there's an actual improvement to the system. It just means routes got worse on other lines somewhere else in the system.

ICE Abducts Bus Driver in Minneapolis

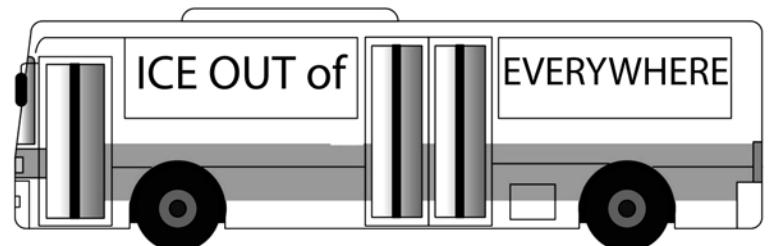
On Dec. 2, ICE abducted a bus driver for Metro Transit. The driver, an ATU 1005 member, was taken by ICE on his way to work, and was detained for more than a month and held in Iowa and Nebraska before finally being released with no explanation.

Bus drivers are a key part of the Minneapolis area. They see it all. And now that one of their own has been targeted, transit workers in the region have had to decide how they will respond as neither the workers nor the passengers are safe from ICE. They have begun to come together to stand with the community and defend each other from ICE terrorism. The ATU 1005 local put out a call for workers and passengers to join the mass protest on January 23. Other transit workers could follow their lead.

ICE in the BAY? Not If But When

It may seem like a mass ICE invasion like what has happened in the Minneapolis region, Chicago, LA and other cities won't happen here in the Bay. The Trump administration threatened a big invasion last October, but then pulled back at the last minute. That doesn't mean it won't happen. ICE is already here anyway even if they haven't sent the same forces as in other raids.

Instead of waiting until after an ICE invasion happens, we would be better off getting prepared now. We see that there's no one coming to save us. It depends on us and what we do. AC Transit workers have an important role to play. It's our co-workers and our passengers and the communities we serve that will be some of the main targets of ICE. What will we do to stick together and defend our communities? We can't afford to wait around and figure things out later.

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Minneapolis Shows the Power We All Have!

Last Friday, tens of thousands of people gathered in Minneapolis for a second day of No Work, No School, No Shopping, No ICE mass demonstrations. Schools shut down and hundreds of small businesses closed, and thousands of workers did not go to work. And this time, Minneapolis called on cities across the country to do the same. And the people responded!

In addition to Minneapolis, we saw over 300 protests in cities across the country, from New York, Chicago, and San Francisco to cities in Maine, Nebraska, Arizona, and many more. Thousands of middle and high school students walked out of class as small business closed their doors and workers skipped work to attend rallies held during school and work hours. The message across the country was clear: we will not accept ICE terror in our cities; we will organize to defend our communities; and we will stop business as usual until ICE leaves. This is exactly what needs to happen, and last Friday was another important step towards building up our forces and seeing the power we have. The people of Minnesota have shown us that no one is coming to save us, and it depends on us.

For weeks, the Trump administration has sent an occupying army of 3,000 ICE and Border Patrol agents to terrorize the Minneapolis region. They have ripped people from their cars and homes, detained and disappeared children, and racially profiled people walking down the street, demanding proof of citizenship. And despite their blatant murders of Rene Good and Alex Pretti, caught on video for the world to see, they have faced no consequences. Instead, the Trump administration has continued their support of ICE, even saying that it was appropriate to kill Good and Pretti because they were “domestic terrorists.” It’s clear that ICE has full immunity to terrorize our communities and even kill those who dare to stand up.

But the people of Minnesota have refused to cave to ICE terror and intimidation. They have continued to show up in greater and greater numbers. They’ve formed neighborhood networks to monitor ICE, communicating through chat groups. They’ve organized foot patrol teams to blow whistles when ICE is present, grouped together to get in ICE’s way, and use their phones to film everything. They were able to show the rest of the country and the world the extent of the terror and brutality ICE was raining down on their city. The footage of these masked ICE thugs

brutalizing workers, young students, and entire families, and blatantly murdering two innocent civilians was impossible for people to accept. People need a place to put their outrage, and the people of Minnesota have shown all of us that we can put it into organizing our communities just as they have done.

If ICE does retreat from Minnesota, it is only because tens of thousands of ordinary people have been willing to stand up to ICE. It is not because of the politicians and their empty words. Minneapolis Mayor Jacob Frey and Democratic Governor Walz have done nothing but talk. Despite what comes out of their mouths, they have both used local police and the National Guard to attack protestors, ultimately providing cover for ICE’s brutality.

The daily resistance to ICE along with these days of mass demonstrations with no work and no school show the power we all have. They remind us of how many people cannot just sit back as this administration carries out its terror at home and abroad. We have to keep building on this momentum. We must deepen our organizing and connections to each other. In our communities, we can begin to connect with our neighbors and prepare what to do if ICE comes to our city or a neighboring city. In our schools, we can coordinate a response to support and defend our immigrant students and colleagues. In our workplaces, we can build up a network to take action in opposition to ICE when they show up. And we can connect all of these efforts, so we defend our whole city together. Even if ICE hasn’t yet raided every city like it has the Minneapolis region, we still need to get organized and prepared for when they do. And together, we can follow the lead of Minnesota and work to organize city-wide days of mass protests of No Work, No School, No Business as Usual until ICE is driven out of our communities.

With this organizing, we can see our common interests and our potential to resist the terror of this administration. It is these efforts that build our power to stand up against ICE and all of the attacks that the Trump administration and the billionaires are imposing on our lives. It is our collective power that has the potential not just to resist their brutal system of exploitation, but to end it, and transform our world to meet the needs of all working people. This is the present that we have to fight against, and the future that we need to fight for.
