She also said that, "I don't have any evidence to suggest that it's widespread." But that wasn't the story they wanted to tell. BART Management didn't want to either. It supports their invasion – sending some of their staff out on the lines to do ride and station checks.

The truth didn't prevent the Chronicle from also quoting this Inspector General who said, ".... it's harmful to riders in the sense that if people are claiming to be working, and they're not, that means their job's not getting done, and that presents itself with what you see on the trains."

It's a set up story. A pre-contract, lazy, over-paid BART worker story! After reading this, if a passenger sees an empty booth or a spill on the platform, what is their conclusion? That the Agent might be in another part of the station dealing with something? Or that the System Service Worker is cleaning something else or on his or her way? Probably not...
