# Affordable Housing is a Myth!

Across the country, landlords and developers are seizing every opportunity to raise rents, kick out workers and the poor, and bring in people able to pay skyrocketing prices. Housing has become a luxury that only the rich can afford.

- About half of the working population can't afford a one-bedroom apartment.
- Over five million households are behind on rent.
- Over 3.7 million people are living "doubled up" (sharing housing with others in small spaces meant for less people).

Nationwide, the average renter is paying more than 30% of their income in rent. But that includes renters of all incomes. For working-class households, especially those in or near big cities, the average renter is paying 50% or more of their income in rent, and having to live farther and farther from work in order to do so.



- In Oakland, California, a worker would need to make about \$77,000 per year just to afford to live in a one-bedroom apartment (to pay about 30% of their income in rent).
- In Baltimore, Maryland, a worker would need to make about \$54,000 per year just to afford to live in a one-bedroom apartment.
- In New Jersey, a worker would need to make about \$86,000 per year just to afford to live in a one-bedroom apartment.

Politicians cater to big developers, who find all sorts of ways to get around offering affordable housing — raising the income level of what counts as affordable, or only offering a few units in a new complex. And there are little to no laws placing restrictions on skyrocketing rents. There are nearly three times as many people in need of affordable housing as there are reduced rental units available. So, hundreds of thousands of low-income families have been on wait lists for years, with no end in sight.

Housing is a necessary part of life and should be guaranteed to every person in society. But the bosses know that if workers can't afford rent, then we are more likely to accept working at low-paid jobs because we need the money. Most workers are just one paycheck away from facing eviction. Under capitalism, expensive housing is just another way for the rich to get richer and for the bosses to try to keep us desperate enough to tolerate their exploitation.

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## Wall Street Money Supports Biden

More than a million people across France demonstrated on May 1, International Workers Day, against the move by the French government to raise the age of retirement. The demonstrations, along with strikes across the workforce, show the anger of the working class at this brutal attack on their quality of life.

About half of all workers with retirement accounts have less than \$10,000 in those accounts when they reach retirement age. How long will \$10,000 last?
