A New Contract?

Rumors were flying around about a new contract proposal. Now it is a reality. There is a contract extension proposed, beginning at the expiration of the current contract at the end of June 2025.

Of course workers face increases in payments into medical and prescription plans. And then there's the question of wages which is the "selling point".

Why is this a wage increase of 2% for the first 6 months and then another 2% increase and the same for the last year? That doesn't add up to a full 4% each year. Even a full 8% increase over two years, wouldn't even begin to make up for what has been lost and is no protection for what could lie ahead.

Inflation?

BART Management calculates inflation in different ways. When it comes to fare increases, the rate of inflation they cite is 5.5%. But when it comes to wages it is a different story. It's 3% or 4%.

It's time for them to get out of their real estate business and whatever else they are up to and figure out how to really maintain this system. And that doesn't just mean maintaining equipment.

The history of this country, like others, has been one of workers fighting back. It starts small and then people decide they have put up with enough.
