AHS Employees Give ICE the Cold Shoulder

AHS employees have repeatedly asked AHS admin for stronger and clearer policies around ICE, similar to what some other hospitals have. Yet admin's response is always the same: we already have policies in place and you can find them on the Intranet.

When employees have questions about how to keep patients and their families safe, the correct response is to provide clearer guidelines, listen to frontline staff input on how to improve those guidelines, and ensure adequate training is provided to all staff who need/want it.

Because the administration is refusing to step up, employees have decided to do so. On December 10th @ 6pm, AHS staff will be hosting a forum for employees, patients, and community members to discuss how best to keep our hospital a safe place for immigrants. Admin is invited to attend to help answer questions and be sure a clear plan is in place.

Layoffs Announced at AHS

We were notified via email a couple weeks ago that 372 positions are being considered in a new workforce reduction plan. Then last week, AHS administration confirmed that these positions would in fact be laid off. Here's what else they've let us know so far:

- 6% of the workforce will be affected by layoffs, including both union and non-union positions.
- Both management and employees will be affected.
- All facilities will face layoffs except St. Rose.
- Laid off employees will be given a 60 day notice.
- Unions will be notified before specific positions are announced, which should be any day now.
- Executives refuse to answer if cuts to their salaries are being considered, sending a clear message that all sacrifice will be carried out by staff, not them.

Cancelled Shift? Know Your Rights!

Although it's rare, every once in a while at Highland we are actually overstaffed for a shift, where there are more nurses scheduled than can be assigned to the number of patients. When this happens, management might try to cancel some of the nurses' overtime shifts. But check your MOU! Management should be asking for volunteers to use PTO and take the day off before cancelling anyone. It's important that we know our rights as outlined in our contract, and not let management take away our shifts. See section 6.15 "Low Census Procedure" for the details.

Workers throughout Alameda Health System are understandably concerned about the upcoming layoffs, which couldn't have come at a worse time right before the holidays. Families are waiting to make travel plans and buy gifts, knowing they might not have jobs in the new year.

But are these deep cuts actually necessary at this moment? We currently don't have a budget deficit, and can't foresee exactly how the federal cuts will play out, so why do the layoffs now? We also don't yet know how many people will accept voluntary resignations or early retirement, and may be cutting substantially more positions than needed. AHS workers know that we are already usually short-staffed, and these substantial layoffs will only make this situation worse.

Workers have found it insulting that upper management has completely taken off the table any discussion of cuts to their own bloated salaries. Do the executives really need to be getting raises while the people who actually do the work at AHS are losing their jobs? It's shameful that this conversation is shut down by management any time we bring it up.

Workers don't want AHS's offers of resume-writing assistance and referrals to the employee assistance program. We want job security and safe staffing so we can keep taking care of our patients and our community, through the holidays and onwards into 2026!
