Their System Provides No Future!

It organizes the economy to serve its own ends. As a consequence on the world scale, there is massive poverty and environmental destruction. Wars have engulfed the lives of people all over the world. The facts of the current world situation are an indictment of this system. It is a situation that we cannot allow to continue.

Destroying Our Planet

<u>Wars</u> There are 15 major wars taking lives today, most involving the U.S. directly or indirectly including:

Democratic Republic of Congo – 10 million killed in the past decade and millions displaced.

Syria – More than 300,000 killed, 4 million refugees, and 7.5 million internally displaced.

Iraq - Iraqi deaths are estimated to be as high as 1.5 million with 4.5 million pushed from their homes. 4493 Americans have been killed.

Afghanistan More than 750,000 civilians have been killed since 2001, more than 20,000 this year. 2358 U.S. troops have been killed.

US Veterans An estimated 320,000 have brain injuries that often result in Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Veteran deaths due to suicides, now average 18 per day.

Climate Change & Global Warming

Scientists agree that the burning of fossil fuels – oil, coal and gas is responsible for much of the signs of climate change we see today. The most visible are melting glaciers and polar ice caps and the powerful storms like Hurricanes Katrina and Wendy and the recent typhoon, Goni, in the western Pacific.

This rapid climate change is responsible for the floods and droughts that currently plague the planet. 2015 is so far, the hottest year on record.

The United Nations estimates that increasingly severe heat waves, floods, storms and forest fires, drought and illnesses associated with climate change are responsible for as many as 150,000 deaths a year. Other reports estimate 400,000 a year.

Those in power refuse to act on this information. Their decisions are based on one thing – profit. If it is more profitable to produce cars than implement efficient mass transit, they produce cars. If it is more profitable to burn coal than to use sustainable forms of energy production, they burn coal.

From their shortsighted, profit-driven view, it is worth the risk. From humanity's view it is suicide.

Their Wealth And The Human Misery It Creates

Oil Profits In four months alone in 2014, Exxon Mobil took in \$8.8 billion in profits. This year profits were \$4.2 billion in four months. They are hardly broke!

Personal Wealth The 80 wealthiest people own \$1.9 trillion, equal to that of the poorest 3.5 billion people.

CEO Pay Walmart and other large corporations oppose the \$15 minimum wage where the starting wage is \$9 an hour. The president of Walmart was paid \$19,392,608 last year. That would be \$9,323 an hour – if he worked 40 hours a week every week of the year), which he didn't. The CEOs of the largest 500 companies in the U.S. are paid 373 times what the average worker earns.

Poverty in the World

Nearly half of the world's population — more than 3 billion people — live on less than \$2.50 a day. More than 1.3 billion live in extreme poverty — less than \$1.25 a day.

At least 80% of the world's people live on less than \$10 a day.

Children There are 2.2 billion children in the world, one billion of them live in poverty.

Oxfam estimates that it would take \$60 billion a year to end extreme global poverty. That's less than one quarter of the income of the richest 100 billionaires!

A Child's Life In The U.S.

The conditions of a society are reflected in the condition of its most vulnerable. The U.S. has the widest gap between rich and poor of any industrialized nation.

More than one in five children live below the U.S. poverty line of less than \$22,000 a year. This ranks the U.S. as 34 of the 35 European and industrialized countries, just above Romania.

In 2007, twelve of every 100 children were on food stamps. Today it is 20 out every 100.

Personal wealth in the U.S. has grown 60% over the past six years. In the same time the number of children who are homeless has increased by the same percent.

Over half of public school students are poor enough to qualify for lunch subsidies and almost half of African-American children under the age of six live in poverty.
