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An Injury to One is an Injury to All!

Since Trump took office, he, his cabinet of billionaires, and Elon Musk have created an overwhelming sense of chaos. Each day, announcements of a new attack on a new group of people or a new agency has crashed over us like relentless storm surges. It has created an atmosphere filled with fear, anger, or sometimes both.

They started by attacking the most vulnerable sections of the population. They preyed on undocumented immigrants and instilled fear through massive raids. People who were just trying to live and survive, sometimes entire families, were indiscriminately detained and deported.

Then it was the stripping of legal rights and healthcare access for transgender people, especially targeting young trans people, banning them from playing sports at their schools. This is an attack on their freedoms and is a bullying tactic against people who do not fit into their narrow view of what is normal.

Then they attacked all federal workers, many of whom are responsible for keeping essential services and programs running. They attacked workers as being inefficient and urged people to quit, work elsewhere, or else be fired. More than 200,000 workers have been fired and an equal number have quit or retired.

They also cut federal grants, targeting massive scientific and medical research efforts. Now, pursuing scientific studies that may improve the health and quality of life of millions of people is not acceptable. They have attacked the pursuit of education, laying off 1,300 Department of Education workers, with the goal of shutting down the Department altogether.

The attacks have extended to punishing any people, particularly young people, who express concern about the violence and oppression we are facing. Mahmoud Khalil, a student at Columbia University, who was active in the opposition to the genocidal war on the Palestinian people has been arrested without any criminal charge and is being threatened with deportation, even though he is a Permanent Resident (green card holder). The administration is making an example of what happens when people speak out. Columbia University is now following demands made by the Trump administration. They expelled and suspended students and revoked diplomas of others. They let ICE raid student rooms in university housing. The institutions that claim to pursue progress and knowledge are turning on their

own communities in the name of maintaining their funding. Sixty other universities are also being investigated.

These are attacks on our most basic freedoms: the freedom of speech, assembly, and even thought! Today, the attacks are focused on these small groups of people or institutions. But these attacks affect us all! By setting these precedents, they can criminalize whomever they deem a threat to those who profit off of our division.

Trump's cabinet of billionaires makes it clear who is leading these assaults and what class they serve. They need to create divisions and instill fear in order to control the majority of us. They are picking us off like prey, chipping away at our rights, hoping to make us too afraid and divided to fight back.

These attacks are not isolated from each other! And they aren't only targeting marginalized groups of people. We are only as safe as our most vulnerable – which means we are all vulnerable. We have a duty to protect each other. And we have no choice but to protect each other if we want a society that is worth living in.

Our lives are linked whether we see and know each other, because collectively we are the ones who really run society. Not only here in the U.S., but around the world.

Once we see that our challenges and concerns are not isolated issues, we can unify our struggles and unify our response against this billionaire class. We may be impacted in different ways, but the attacker is the same. We must fight back against the billionaires exploiting and disposing of us for their profits. When someone injures us, we must disarm our attacker and stop them from injuring anyone else! We can only do that together. Some have already begun.

Baltimore, Maryland:

Students Fall behind Because of Long Commutes to School

Most middle and high school students in Baltimore City must take public transit to school. They spend on average 40 minutes every day commuting. Every day is a chaotic routine of trying, and often failing, to get to school on time. Being late leads to lost education and unjust punishment. Many politicians and media try to blame the families and students. But these are lies. City buses in Baltimore, like many other cities, are so infrequent and unreliable that it would be impossible for students to arrive on time every day.

These long commutes result from the long, racist history of discrimination in housing, education, and transportation. Students in poor neighborhoods all across the country, especially students of color, face similar problems. It will take a real fight to get reliable transportation and quality education for all students no matter where they live.

Bay Area, California:

Who Will Pay for Oakland's Budget Crisis?

Oakland has a budget crisis, with a \$130 million deficit this year. City officials' big solution is to raise sales taxes. In April, Oakland voters will decide whether to approve this increase.

Sales taxes hit working-class people hardest. Can't we raise property taxes on big corporations and the wealthy? The short answer is: not in California. Our current laws don't allow it.

So instead, Oakland officials are threatening us, saying that the sales tax increase is the only way to prevent further job layoffs and cuts to public services. The politicians say that this sales tax rate will match neighboring cities. But that just means that working people there are also getting shafted. One way or another, the politicians and the wealthy want the people of Oakland to pay the price for the budget crisis.

We live in the wealthiest country in the world, and it is our labor that has created all of this wealth. We aren't the ones who benefit from this. The super rich — the bosses of the big corporations and banks — keep the wealth and make all the decisions. Working people do the work that makes society run, and we can organize to unite our forces. When we do, we have enormous power to change things and make a better world.

The Triangle, North Carolina:

Backlash against Student Activism in NC and around the Country

The University of North Carolina System has passed a new policy for campus gatherings. It requires gatherings of a certain number (decided by local campuses) to give administrators 36-hours notice. It bans anything that would "substantially disrupt" the universities' missions. It prohibits camping without campus approval.

This is in response to student activism for Palestine in the last 16 months. The Board of Governors would like to intimidate students who would otherwise speak out against the genocide in Gaza. This comes after a long list of steps the board has taken to intimidate student activists, and carry out other right-wing policies, like dismantling DEI and falling in line with ICE raids. The administration wants to effectively ban student dissent. We must oppose these restrictions!

Newark, New Jersey:

Cuts and Protest in New Jersey

Under Trump's budget cuts, Rutgers University is expected to lose at least \$57 million in research funding. These cuts are part of the right-wing attack on science that is targeting free speech and even facts themselves.

These cuts affect not only scientists and knowledge. They're an attack on the lives of working people and students who need these programs to pay their bills and improve their lives. They affect students as well as support staff, now being labeled non-essential by the Trump administration even though programs couldn't function without them. These are working people who need their jobs to feed their families.

Hundreds rallied in Trenton recently at a "Stand Up for Science" march. Hopefully this is just the beginning of our fight back.
