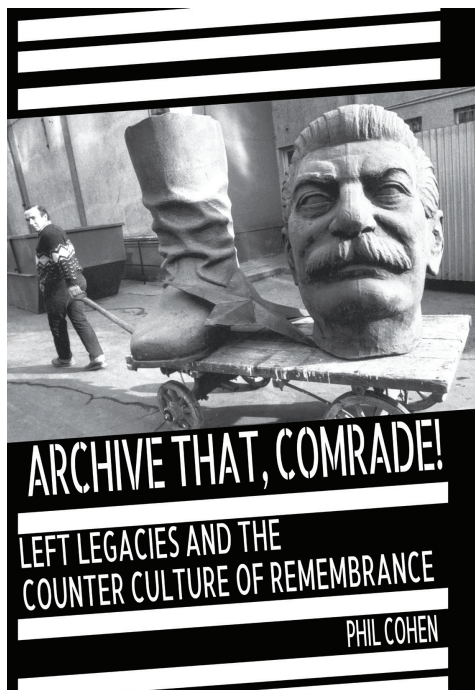


Archive That, Comrade!

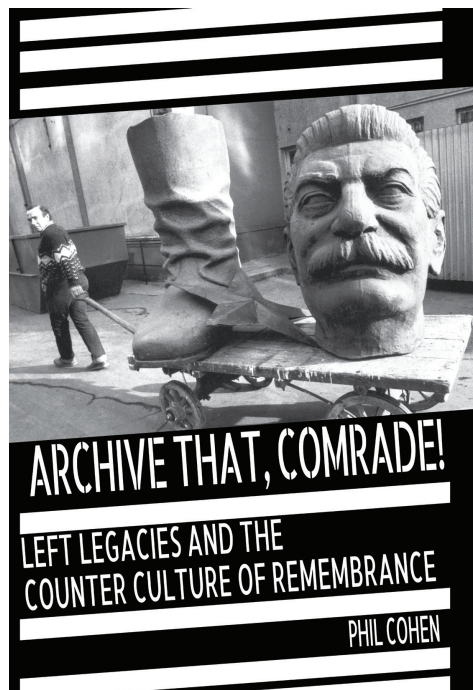
